Annual Report of Good Shepherd School for the academic year 2025–26. This academic year has been a year of meaningful progress and collective achievement. Every milestone we reached was the outcome of dedicated teamwork and the consistent efforts of our students and faculty. The year witnessed steady growth across academic, co-curricular, and developmental domains, each reflecting the school's commitment to excellence. Our teachers have worked with unwavering dedication, and our students have responded with enthusiasm and determination, striving to realise their full potential. We are deeply grateful to our parents whose support and cooperation have been integral to every success we celebrate today. We take immense pride in the outstanding CBSE Board examination results of 2024–25.

79 students appeared and all 79 came out with flying colours.

30 students secured 90% and 38 students secured 80%, demonstrating commendable academic excellence.

Our school topper, Gautam Rajesh, achieved an impressive 98.8%, marking one of the finest performances of the year.

These accomplishments stand as a testament to the consistent effort of our students, the dedicated guidance of our teachers, and the steadfast support of our parents.

One of the notable highlights of the year was the CBSE X Cluster Athletic Meet, hosted by our school on 24 and 25 July. This was followed by the Thrissur Sahodaya Athletic Meet 2025, held on 27 and 28 November at the Kunnamkulam Senior Ground, inaugurated by Dr. Dinesh Babu M., SSCT President. Nearly 1500 students from 46 schools took part. Bharatiya Vidya Bhavan, Eravimangalam, emerged as champions.

Our students secured notable positions:

Hansel Dayson bagged the third position in High Jump (U-17).

Annliya Grace secured the third position in the 50 m (U-12).

The National Institute for Open Schooling (NIOS) Examination was conducted at our school, which functioned as an examination centre. Our teachers ensured all arrangements were carried out with commendable efficiency and professionalism.

The school conducts several competitions every academic year. The Talent Fest, Saamatwa 2025, unfolded over two vibrant days, featuring performances across two stages, Thillana and Jathiswaram. The event was inaugurated by the gifted musician and audio engineer, Mr. Sayurdev PS.

The spirit of democracy was upheld through the School Cabinet Election held on June 17th. Madhav Relish of Grade X C and Anna Johnson of Grade X A were elected as the Head Boy and the Head Girl. Josh MC. of Grade IX C and Vaishnawa T. S. of Grade IX A took charge as the Assistant Head Boy and the Assistant Head Girl. They took the oath with pride and a strong sense of responsibility during the Investiture Ceremony held on June 24th, which also marked the inauguration of the various school clubs.

Other notable celebrations of the year included Independence Day, Basheer Dinam, Hindi Day, Onam, Teachers' Day, Science and Mathematics Exhibition—Ignite 2025, Kerala Piravi, Children's Day, English Fest, Christmas, and the Chavara Day. The Annual Sports Day was held at the senior ground, Kunnamkulam, in all pomp and glory. Existing records were broken and new records were set. The Gandhi House and the Nehru House have emerged the winners in the Annual Sports Meet 2025.

The PTWA General Body Meeting was held on 23rd August at our school. We were honoured to have Sister Nima Grace as the Chief Guest. She shared wonderful ideas about how children learn and how learning can be made more meaningful. The meeting was made even more special with the presence of PTWA President Mr. Jojith T Rajan from the Main School, Mr. Vipin Krishna from the KG Section, and other parents, helping to strengthen the bond between the parents and school.

In this temple of learning, curricular and co-curricular activities go hand-in-hand. Our students participated actively in an array of competitive examinations including the English Language Proficiency Scholarship Examination, Maths Talent Search Examination and the Ujjwal Prathiba Examinations. Adam Mathew Paul of Grade IV won a third place in the much coveted Thrissur Sahodaya ELPS Exam and Hanoch Paul Jijo of Grade VIII secured a third place in the prestigious Ujjwal Prthiba Examinations held in this academic year.

At Good Shepherd, our students are encouraged to grow as responsible and dedicated citizens, and they have consistently shown their enthusiasm to engage with the world around them. To provide meaningful exposure to

society, students participate in educational field trips. This year, Grade 9 enjoyed a three-day excursion to Mysore and Ooty, while Grade 8 explored Ayurveda practices during a visit to Ashtangam Hospital. Alongside these educational visits, students from all classes—from KG2 to Grade 9—were taken on trips that combined learning with relaxation, ensuring a balance between academics and experiential growth.
